

Re: Important Consumer Information Announcement

Attention All Students, Staff and Faculty:

The Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended by the Higher Education Opportunity Act of 2008 (HEOA), requires Holy Family University to make available to enrolled students, prospective students, and their parents or legal guardians certain information about its operations. Such information pertains to: (1) general institutional operations and policies; (2) financial assistance (federal grants, loans, state grants, etc.); (3) programs leading to licensure and certification, state information; (4) general completion and graduation rates; (5) annual security report; (6) completion and graduation rates for all students and student athletes; (7) athletic program participation rates and financial support; and (8) Voter Registration information. All of the required disclosures are available on the [Holy Family University website](https://www.holyfamily.edu/about-holy-family-u/general-info/consumer-info/heoa) (<https://www.holyfamily.edu/about-holy-family-u/general-info/consumer-info/heoa>). Our [Annual Security and Fire Safety report](#) is published each year by October 1st, and is readily available through campus email, the [Consumer Information](#) website, and the [Public Safety](#) website. This report contains statistics of campus crime for the preceding three calendar years, plus details about efforts taken to improve campus safety. The report also includes policy statements regarding (but not limited to) the following: crime reporting, campus facility security and access, law enforcement authority, incidence of alcohol and drug use, and the prevention of/response to sexual assault, domestic or dating violence, and stalking.

Should an emergency or crisis situation arise, University officials may need to contact its student community or someone else on their behalf. Students are encouraged to provide the information for at least one contact to the University; additionally, it is recommended that all students review and update their current contact information.
